Under-6 League: Born during or after 2010-2011

Under-7 League: Born 2009

Under-8 League: Born 2008

Under-10 League: Born 2006 & 2007

Season Length: 8 weeks: Monday, May 2-June 30

Days & Times:

Under-6 Mon and/or Tues and/or Fri (1 game per week)

Under-7 & Under 8 Wed and/or Thurs and/or Fri (1 game per week)

Under-10 Girls Mon and/or Wed and/or Fri (1 game per week)

Under-10 Boys Tues and/or Thurs and/or Fri (1 game and 1 training session per week)

BASKETBALL NEWS:

New Revamped Spring League Basketball!

There are now 2 separate ways to play spring league basketball.

1. 3 on 3 Competitive.

This league will be anyone who wants to play competitively, previous basketball experience is recommended.

Designed for experienced players looking for strong competition and more game experience.

Players will make their own team of up to 6 players

Each team will play twice a week: 40-minute cross-court games.

2. D-League (Developmental League)

This league is a learn and play division where you can come if you are not wanting a competitive experience or if you have little basketball experience.

Designed for players new to the game

Male and female players would register in one of two age categories:

- Grades 3, 4, and 5
- Grade 6, 7 and 8

Each player will attend sessions twice a week.

30 minutes learning skills and drills; 30 minutes playing in controlled scrimmages.

Goal: To work with players on the fundamentals of the game and practicing their new skills in game-like situations.

Good Day, Wildwood Community

I hear that the Coffee with a Cop with Inspector Shalovelo went well!

He advised me that there was some concern about when police should be called... We always strongly encourage our communities to call in any suspicious activity to our main line which is 306-975-8300...Suspicious activity could include a variety of things...especially with the concerns in your park...Kids hanging out late at night, unknown vehicles driving through the neighborhood, people looking into windows of parked vehicles, suspicious people going door to door, etc...You know your neighborhood and if something seems off and doesn't belong, there is nothing wrong with calling police to ask for a patrol car to swing by. This gives us the opportunity to gather information, not only about the activity in your neighborhood but about any suspicious people/vehicles who might be hanging around.

Of course if it's an emergency (major injuries, weapons, assaults in progress, etc), please be sure to call 911...

Our online reporting is also an excellent option if there has been graffiti, theft from vehicle, mischief, etc...You can report these types of offences online if you have no idea who is responsible...this saves you from having to come down to the police service to report...You can go directly to our Saskatoon Police Service website (saskatoonpoliceservice.ca) scroll down and you'll see online reporting on the left side with a "start here" button... very simple and convenient to use. It also outlines which type of reports can be left online.

I hope this information helps, perhaps you can include it in one of your news letters to share it with the other members of your community.

Please let me know what you thought about the Coffee with a Cop and if there were any other concerns that may have arisen as a result.

Director of Adult Programs

Role: Responsible for the planning, management and coordination of all indoor recreational activities.

Responsibilities:

1. Attend monthly Board meetings and report the progress of registration, participation, etc.
2. Prepare a list of programs to be offered, time schedules and fees to be charged for approval by the Executive.
3. Apply through the public school board and through the principals of the separate schools for the use of school facilities.
4. Coordinate the registration of the fall, winter and spring indoor programs.
5. Prepare information and reports to be submitted to the Association and Community Development Branch, City of Saskatoon.
6. Prepare Program Information Forms (yellow sheets) and submit them to Community Development Branch. Submit requests to the City for instructors and hire instructors where necessary.

7. Ensure registration date, program activities, descriptions, locations, dates, times and fee schedules are advertised in the Community Association newsletter prior to registration.
8. Resolve situations arising with schools, caretakers, programs and participants.
9. Submit an annual budget.
10. Recruit volunteers for parent supervision and registrations.
11. Watch for and encourage new individuals to volunteer for the Community Association.

Moderate February – May & October – December
